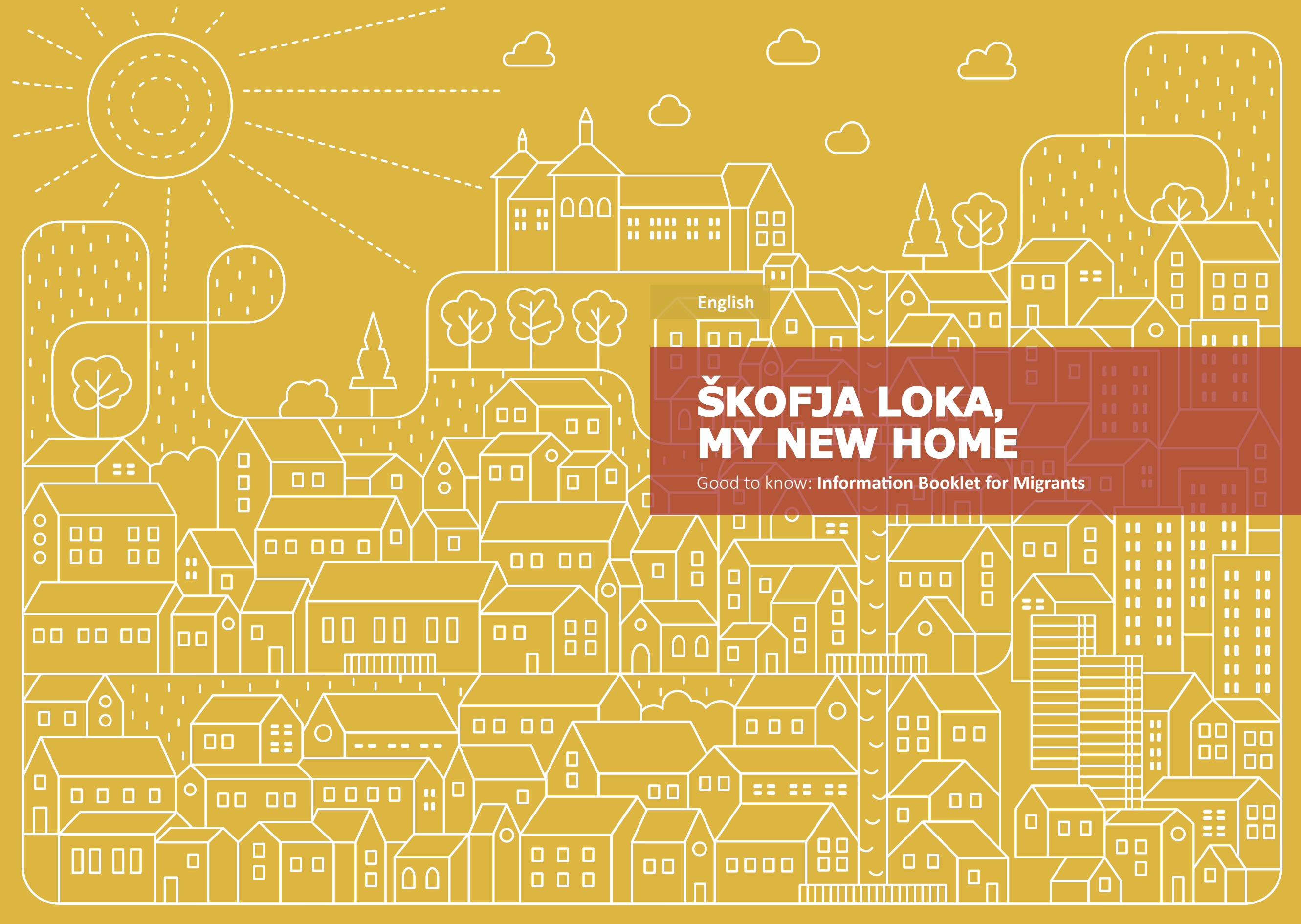

THE MUNICIPALITY OF ŠKOFJA LOKA

The Municipality of Škofja Loka is located where the pre-Alpine Škofja Loka Hills and Polhov Gradec Hills transition into the Ljubljana Basin. The town lies at the junction of the Selca Valley and the Poljane Valley with the Sora Plain. Throughout history, this territory has been an important transit area.

It has preserved its favourable transport connections to this day: it is located 26 kilometres from Ljubljana and 20 kilometres from Ljubljana Airport. The Ljubljana–Jesenice railway line also passes nearby.

For over 800 years, the town was the administrative, economic and cultural centre of a feudal fief bestowed by the German Emperor Otto II to the Freising diocese from Bavaria in 973.

Today, the Municipality of Škofja Loka covers an area of 146 km² with around 23,000 inhabitants. Škofja Loka is a regional centre that has several administrative institutions, as well as social (public) activities and a service (central) sector of wider significance. It is considered an important centre of business activity with highly developed industry.

What can I arrange at the administrative unit?

At the administrative unit, you can take care of matters related to residence permits, the registration of your temporary or permanent residence, individual permits for work and residence (see the Employment section), marriages, the issue of birth certificates and many other things (driving licences, the replacement of lost documents, etc.).

You can only apply for a temporary residence permit if you have entered Slovenia legally and you meet the other conditions (e.g. if you study or work in Slovenia). As a general rule, you must apply for the initial permit at a consulate or embassy of the Republic of Slovenia abroad. Under the new rules, provided you have entered Slovenia legally, you may also apply at any administrative unit in the Republic of Slovenia, where you will also be asked to provide your fingerprints and signature on a tablet. You can apply for a permit extension at any administrative unit in Slovenia. If you relocate, you will need to register a temporary residence within 8 days at an administrative unit. If you do not understand and speak Slovenian very well, you should also find an interpreter/translator to assist you in carrying out the necessary procedures at the administrative unit.

A residence permit is issued to children born in Slovenia of its own motion. The parents must submit the child's photo and birth certificate – if the child already has one – to the administrative unit within 3 months. The child will not be entitled to health insurance until he or she has a residence permit.

Teaching the Slovenian language and familiarisation with Slovenian society takes place in a single programme called the Initial Integration of Immigrants – ZIP. In the course of the programme, which covers several different subject areas, the participants are taught how to communicate in the new environment and acquire the knowledge needed to take the “Slovene as a Second and Foreign Language” proficiency test, particularly at the introductory and basic levels (A1 and A2/B1).

Foreign nationals from third countries are eligible to participate in the ZIP programme if they:

- are residing in the Republic of Slovenia on the basis of a temporary residence permit issued with a validity of one year as a minimum;
- are family members of Slovenian or EU citizens residing in the Republic of Slovenia on the basis of a residence permit for a family member of an EU citizen, irrespective of the length of their stay and the validity period of their temporary residence permit;
- reside in the Republic of Slovenia on the basis of recognised temporary protection in accordance with the law governing temporary protection for displaced persons.

If you want to participate in the ZIP programme, you need to obtain a Certificate of Eligibility for participation in the programme, which is issued by the administrative unit.

To extend a temporary residence permit for the purpose of family reunification, you need to have passed a Slovenian language proficiency exam at the so-called “survival level”. If you wish to enrol in an informal Slovenian language course at the survival level, you must obtain a Certificate of Eligibility for participation in an informal programme from the administrative office.

To submit an application at the administrative office and have the certificate issued, you will need to pay an administrative fee of 22.60 euros.

If you wish to avoid waiting in line, you can book an appointment at the administrative unit through the **eSamonaročanje** web application. You can find all the information on the www.gov.si web portal.

What kind of assistance can the social work centre provide?

You can contact the social work centre any time you are in distress or have a problem. The advisers will help you. They can provide financial assistance, help with integrating into the community, support for families and children, and consultations on a variety of topics.

Initial social assistance refers to the initial conversation with a social worker, where you discuss your problem and find a solution together. You will receive information on the types of help available and how to obtain it, including financial assistance and help provided by other organisations (the Red Cross, Karitas, etc.).

How can you access initial social assistance? Visit the centre during office hours for your first conversation with a social worker. There is no need to make an appointment in advance. In emergencies, you can also find help outside office hours, but only during opening hours.

Personal assistance means personalised long-term counselling aimed at solving your problems. It can also include handling various matters and providing guidance. It depends on your needs, and the only condition is your voluntary and active cooperation. You will be assigned an adviser who will help you draw up a plan to solve the problem and will guide you on your way, helping you to reach the solution and organise your life.

Family counselling means providing assistance with relationships between family members and childcare. It is similar to personal assistance but with multiple family members included in the counselling.

Financial assistance: You can apply for child benefits, social assistance benefits in cash, income support, reduced kindergarten fees, subsidised meals for primary and secondary school students, subsidies for rent, exemption from payments for compulsory health insurance and/or social assistance services, etc.

Compulsory Health Insurance

Compulsory health insurance is provided by the Health Insurance Institute of Slovenia (ZZZS) in accordance with the principles of social justice and solidarity among the healthy and the sick, the old and the young, the rich and the poor. Health insurance in the Republic of Slovenia is compulsory for anyone who meets the conditions laid down in the Health Care and Health Insurance Act (hereinafter: the ZZZVZZ). Under the ZZZVZZ, the insured persons include the insurance holders and their family members. People who meet the conditions set forth in Article 15 of the ZZZVZZ must be enrolled in compulsory health insurance as insured persons, while those who meet the conditions set forth in Articles 20 through 22 of the ZZZVZZ are included in the compulsory health insurance as family members.

The ZZZVZZ includes an obligation for the insured persons for the payment of contributions, also specifying who is liable for paying them and who is responsible for enrolling the person in compulsory health insurance, the type of contributions and the basis on which they are calculated, as well as the scope of benefits.

The payment of mandatory contributions is tied to the source of basic social security for the insured person (employment, pension, self-employed activity, disability allowance, personal funds or social assistance).

If a Slovenian citizen with a permanent residence in the Republic of Slovenia does not meet the criteria for insurance coverage under any of items 1 through 20 and items 22 to 25 of Article 15 of the ZZZVZZ, they shall be enrolled in compulsory health insurance by the competent Social Work Centre, which will also determine whether the person meets the criteria. Family members are covered under the compulsory health insurance through an insured person as the insurance holder, if they do not meet the eligibility criteria to become insured persons themselves.

Registering, modifying or deregistering individuals for or from compulsory health insurance is carried out at the local unit or office of the ZZZS on the basis of an application form.

Compulsory health insurance enables insured persons to exercise their rights to healthcare services, medication, medical devices and financial benefits, such as wage compensation during sick leave and the reimbursement of travel expenses related to the exercise of rights to health services.

HOW TO FIND A PHYSICIAN

Compulsory Healthcare Contribution

On 31 December 2023, complementary health insurance was abolished and a new compulsory health contribution (OZP) was introduced in January 2024, which, together with the existing contributions for compulsory health insurance, ensures 100% financing of benefits under the compulsory health insurance coverage.

Once you have taken care of your compulsory health insurance, you will need to choose a personal physician (GP) who you will consult in case of health issues. The list of available physicians is available on the website of the Health Insurance Institute of Slovenia (ZZZS), under the tab Medical Services – Select Your Personal Physician. The health centre also houses clinics for infants and school-age children, offering medical services and counselling.

In addition to a personal GP, you are expected to choose a personal dentist and a personal gynaecologist.

Health centres also offer counselling services, which provide information on how to look after your health, have a healthy diet, stay physically active, maintain a healthy weight, live without harmful habits (such as smoking or drinking alcohol), maintain good interpersonal relationships and manage stress. All counselling services and workshops are free of charge and open to everyone looking to do something positive for their health. Enquire at your nearest health centre for details.

At the Mental Health Centres for children, adolescents and adults, we provide comprehensive care for individuals with mental health issues. You can get an appointment even without a referral. Enquire at your nearest health centre for details.

For urgent medical assistance, call the free phone number 112 or visit an emergency unit, which is open 24/7.

KINDERGARTEN

The **Škofja Loka Kindergarten** encompasses 10 units in 11 different locations.

- **Unit BIBA:** Podlubnik 1e, Škofja Loka;
- **Unit BUKOVICA:** Bukovica 34, 4227 Selca;
- **Unit CICIBAN:** Sveti Duh 11, Škofja Loka;
- **Unit KAMNITNIK:** Partizanska 1e, Škofja Loka;
- **Unit NAJDIHOJCA:** Podlubnik 1d, Škofja Loka;
- **Unit ROŽLE:** Frankovo naselje 61, Škofja Loka;
- **Unit PEDENJPED:** Frankovo naselje 51a, Škofja Loka;
- **Department Reteče:** Reteče 43, Škofja Loka;
- **Unit POD GRADOM:** Kapucinski trg 2, Škofja Loka;
- **Unit KAMENČEK:** Partizanska cesta 1c, Škofja Loka;

Children can enrol in the kindergarten starting at 11 months of age, or from the end of maternity leave until they start school. It is recommended that children spend no more than 9 hours in the kindergarten. Most departments in the kindergarten are homogenous, meaning that they only include children born in the same year. The educational/childcare programme in the department is carried out by a preschool teacher and an assistant preschool teacher.

ENROLMENT IN KINDERGARTEN

To enrol in the kindergarten, you must complete the **enrolment form**, which is available on the kindergarten's website, and submit it in person at the kindergarten's administrative office (Enota Kamnitnik, Partizanska cesta 1e, 4220 Škofja Loka), send it by mail, or email it to vpis@vrtec-skofjaloka.si. Once a year (in early March), the kindergarten holds its regular enrolment period, and enrolment forms submitted during this time are given priority for admission at the start of the new school year – that is, on 1 September. You can also submit your enrolment form at any time during the school year, but enrolment is only possible if there are openings.

MEDICAL CERTIFICATE

For a child to be enrolled in the kindergarten, you will need to provide a **medical certificate**, completed by the child's personal physician (a paediatrician practising in Slovenia). The certificate must clearly indicate that the child has been vaccinated against measles, mumps and rubella. A medical certificate must be submitted **no later than the day of enrolment in the kindergarten**. If the child is on a special **diet**, a certificate **confirming the medically prescribed diet**, provided by the child's paediatrician, must also be provided to the kindergarten.

REDUCED KINDERGARTEN PAYMENT

- An application to claim rights to public funds, i.e., reduced kindergarten payments, must be submitted to the Social Work Centre for each child enrolling in kindergarten.
- Kindergarten is free for a second child if their older sibling is also enrolled at the same time. Kindergarten is also free for the third and each subsequent child, regardless of whether their siblings are enrolled in kindergarten.

PREPARATIONS FOR KINDERGARTEN ENROLMENT

- A group meeting for the parents of newly enrolled children in June.
- An individual discussion with the preschool teachers, attended by parents together with their child (approximately one week before the child starts). During the meeting, you will discuss your child's habits (how they fall asleep most easily, how they calm down, what they like to play with, their eating habits, etc.), your experiences with childcare so far, any health issues, and any consultations you might have had with various specialists.

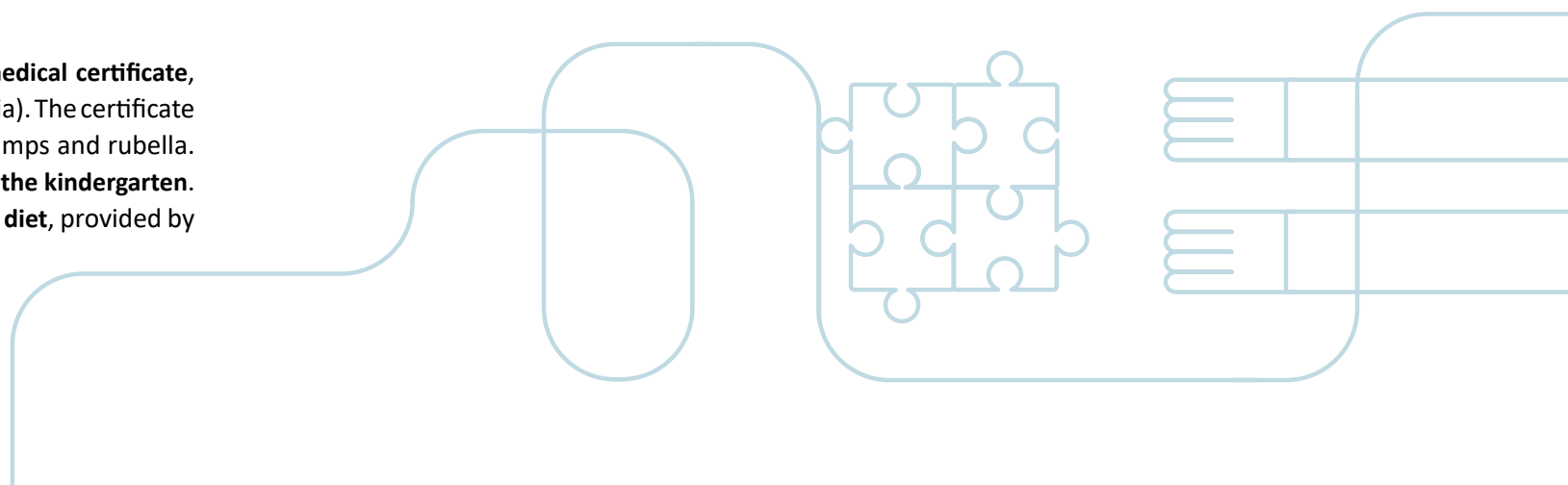
GRADUAL ADAPTATION TO KINDERGARTEN

It's perfectly normal for a child to cry more when starting kindergarten, to be more sensitive and tired, and to have trouble with sleeping and appetite ... This usually lasts a few days and passes quickly for most children.

Parents are therefore advised to take **a few days off** to help with the adaptation and to be present at the kindergarten with their child. Please discuss your arrival time and the amount of time you will spend at the kindergarten with the teacher. In the first few days, your child should bring their favourite toy to the kindergarten to remind them of home.

CHILDREN'S NECESSITIES IN KINDERGARTEN

- Each child should have **a change of clothes and shoes, labelled slippers, a bag for dirty clothes, and a sufficient supply of diapers and wet wipes at the kindergarten**.
- During the initial period, it is recommended that children bring along a **favourite toy or plushie**.



WORKING WITH PARENTS

Parents can get information about their child and the kindergarten via:

- **daily communication** between the preschool teachers and parents,
- **parent-teacher conferences**, which take place once a month (parents are expected to attend at least once a year or whenever invited by the preschool teacher),
- **department parents' conferences**, which are held twice a year (parents are expected to attend both conferences),
- **general meetings at the department and unit level**,
- **lectures for parents**.

Important information for parents is posted on the **bulletin boards at the entrances to the playrooms** and on the **e-playrooms** (each class has its own e-playroom, for which parents create a user account and log in using a password provided by the class teacher). NOTIFYING THE KINDERGARTEN OF A CHILD'S ABSENCE

If you will not be bringing your child to the kindergarten, you need to report their absence by 7.00 a.m. that morning at the latest via the **WEB VRTEC** online application (select the days your child will be absent and provide a reason, e.g., illness). You will receive access to the app via email.

ATTENDANCE IN CASE OF ILLNESS

Parents should **NOT** bring their child to the kindergarten if the child:

- has had a fever, diarrhoea or vomiting in the past 48 hours,
- has a rash,
- has lice or scabies.

For other illnesses, follow your doctor's instructions. When considering the return of the child to the kindergarten after an illness, it is also important to consider the child's overall physical condition, well-being and ability to eat, sleep and play normally.

If an illness breaks out, kindergartens inform parents about preventive measures through notices posted on bulletin boards. **If a child falls ill at the kindergarten, the parents are notified immediately, and they are expected to come pick up their child as soon as possible.** This helps protect the health of the other children at the kindergarten and ensures that the sick child receives proper care at home.

EARLY INTERVENTION

If developmental issues are identified in a child, they will receive additional professional support at the kindergarten. This involves cooperation between parents, the kindergarten and the healthcare system. If you have any further questions, please contact the kindergarten's counselling service.

PRIMARY SCHOOL

Slovenia has compulsory primary education for children from 6 to 15 years of age. Primary school has nine grades and is free of charge. Your child should be enrolled in the first grade of primary school in the calendar year in which they turn 6. Enrolment in primary school takes place in February. Visit your nearest primary school to learn more about enrolment and the curriculum, including for children who have previously attended primary school. Information on reduced fees for brunch and lunch is available at the social work centre.

The Jela Janežič Primary School is a special education school that offers two programmes:

- **Adapted basic school programme with a lower educational standard – NIS;**
- **Special Education Programme – PP.**

Staff members from the Jela Janežič Elementary School provide **Additional Professional Support – DSP** at other schools and kindergartens.

SECONDARY SCHOOL

Secondary education has three or four grades and takes place in general upper secondary schools (gimnazija), vocational schools and technical schools. Calls for enrolment are published in February. The schools also hold visitors' days in February where you can find out more about the curriculum. Enrolment takes place in March. Secondary school students may also be entitled to a reduced brunch fee.

ADULT EDUCATION

Are you an adult looking to finish your education? Would you like to further your education? You have a number of options available for finishing or obtaining a formal education, as well as for participating in free non-formal education programmes, such as workshops and talks on personal growth, strengthening basic skills, easier integration into the local environment, etc. Do you have the skills and know-how for a specific vocation but no formal qualifications? You can enrol in the National Vocational Qualification (Nacionalna poklicna kvalifikacija, NPK) programme, which is the fastest way to the vocation you want. Pay a visit to the Škofja Loka Adult Education Centre, where they will advise and assist you. Some adult education programmes are free of charge.

Some adult education programmes are also available at the Institute of the RS for Vocational Education and Training (Center RS za poklicno izobraževanje, www.cpi.si/o-cpi/kje-smo) and the Institute for Business Education (Center za poslovno usposabljanje, www.cpu.si).

Slovenian Language Courses

Learning Slovenian is sure to make your life in a new environment easier. Citizens of third countries (all countries except the EU and EEA member states and Switzerland) can take advantage of the free Slovenian language course organised as part of the programme for initial immigrant integration (Začetna integracija priseljencev, ZIP). The courses are organised throughout Slovenia; the provider's contact details are included below. 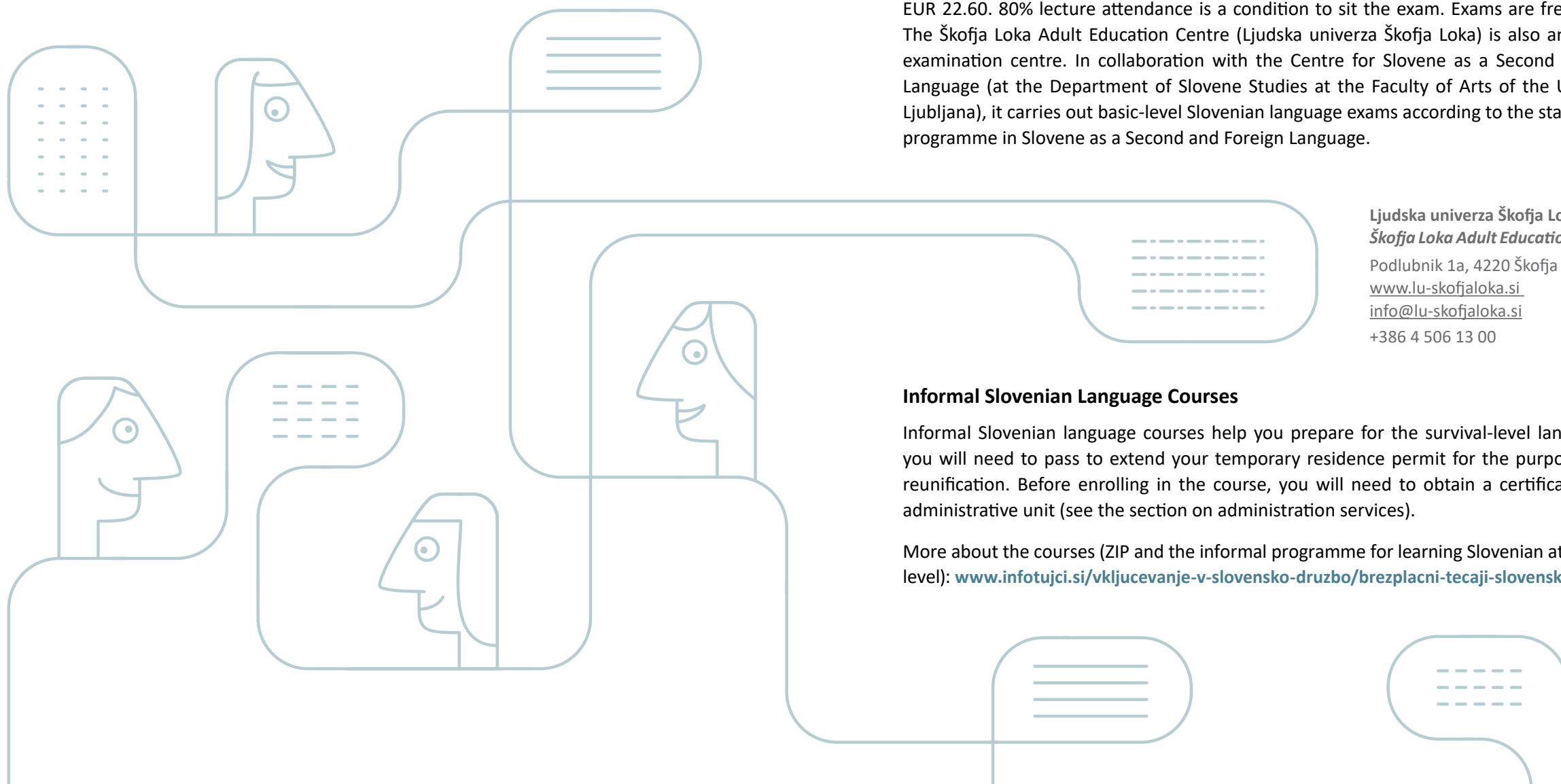
You can take part in the course if you have a valid residence permit, have not completed and are not currently enrolled in an education programme in Slovenia and have not yet passed the basic-level Slovenian language exam. The course lasts up to 180 hours. In order to take part, you will need a certificate from the administrative unit (Certificate on meeting the enrolment conditions – Potrdilo o izpolnjevanju pogojev za udeležbo v enotnem programu), which costs EUR 22.60. 80% lecture attendance is a condition to sit the exam. Exams are free of charge. The Škofja Loka Adult Education Centre (Ljudska univerza Škofja Loka) is also an authorised examination centre. In collaboration with the Centre for Slovene as a Second and Foreign Language (at the Department of Slovene Studies at the Faculty of Arts of the University of Ljubljana), it carries out basic-level Slovenian language exams according to the state-approved programme in Slovene as a Second and Foreign Language.

Informal Slovenian Language Courses

Informal Slovenian language courses help you prepare for the survival-level language exam you will need to pass to extend your temporary residence permit for the purpose of family reunification. Before enrolling in the course, you will need to obtain a certificate from the administrative unit (see the section on administration services).

EMPLOYMENT

The application for a work permit is included in the application for a single permit for work and residence, which enables foreign nationals from third countries to enter, live and work in Slovenia. The application for a single permit should be submitted at the administrative unit if you are already in Slovenia or at the Slovenian consulate or embassy in your country. Before submitting the application, make sure you notify your employer, as they will need to ensure that their tax obligations are settled in full on the day of submission.

The procedure for issuing the single residence and work permit is managed by the administrative unit, while approval for the single residence and work permit is issued by the Employment Service, provided you meet the required conditions. The conditions differ depending on the type of work.

Work permits for citizens of Bosnia and Herzegovina and citizens of Serbia, as well as for seasonal jobs in agriculture that last under 90 days, are issued by the Employment Service.

Self-employment: Foreign nationals can enter into self-employment after a one-year uninterrupted legal stay in Slovenia or after registering in the business register. In this case, approval from the Employment Service is not required.
